Founded in 1867, Rowland Hall-St. Mark's School, popularly known as Rowland Hall, is an independent, coeducational, college-preparatory day school serving students in preschool through grade twelve. There are 67 students in the Class of 2012.

ACCREDITATION & MEMBERSHIPS

Rowland Hall is accredited by the Pacific Northwest Association of Independent Schools (PNAIS) and maintains membership in the National Association of Independent Schools (NAIS), the National Association for College Admission Counseling (NACAC), Rocky Mountain Association for College Admission Counseling (RMACAC), The College Board, and the Association of College Counselors in Independent Schools (ACCIS).

ACADEMIC CALENDAR

Rowland Hall operates on a trimester system with trimester grades available at the conclusion of each trimester in December, March, and June. First trimester grades are considered "Midyear" grades for college admission purposes. Most students take five academic courses per trimester. Rowmark Ski Academy students carry four academic courses per trimester to allow for a full afternoon of dryland or "on-the-hill" training at Park City Mountain Resort.

ROWMARK SKI ACADEMY

Twenty-two Upper School students train for competitive alpine skiing as part of Rowmark Ski Academy. Further information is available at www.rowmark.org and on the Rowmark-specific supplement included with transcripts for Rowmark students.

GRADE POINT AVERAGE

Rowland Hall calculates trimester and cumulative GPA on a 4.0 point scale. Grades in AP classes are weighted and add one point per AP class to students' GPAs. Rowland Hall does not rank. The highest grade offered at Rowland Hall is A, but as a result of weighting for AP classes, some students earn a cumulative GPA higher than 4.0. Personal Fitness, Physical Education, Athletic Teams, Yearbook, Newspaper, and Student Council are non-GPA bearing courses. The final cumulative GPAs for the Class of 2011 were as follows.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT

Rowland Hall offers a full range of AP courses, and the majority of students graduate having taken at least one AP course. Juniors who plan to take more than two AP courses, and seniors who plan to take more than three AP courses, must gain permission from the academic department chairs committee to exceed that number. Students enrolled in AP courses must take the corresponding AP exam(s). In May 2011, 121 students took 321 exams. 82% scored a 3 or higher, 63% scored a 4 or higher, and 32% scored a 5.

The following 16 AP courses are offered this year at Rowland Hall. English Language & Composition, English Literature & Composition, European History, US History, Statistics, Calculus AB, Calculus BC, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Psychology, French, Spanish, Latin, Studio Art, Music Theory
